### Birding in Belmar

Tom Close, Irene Ludwig, and Gerry Forney joined Karleen Schofield at Belmar Park, Lakewood, on Saturday, Dec. 9, a sunny, mild morning. Kountz Lake is an important feature of the park's habitats, attracting hundreds to thousands of geese and waterfowl (ducks mostly, in late fall and winter). Water along the shoreline of the lake was frozen, but about 800 geese and 10 species of ducks were actively swimming keeping the water from freezing in the center of the lake. Many of the waterfowl were sleeping, with bills tucked into their back feathers (not under the wing, as non-birder might assume).

Several dozen ring-billed gulls were resting on the lake's island; a red-shafted northern flicker flew by, followed by black-bill magpies broadcasting their names, "Mag, mag, mag!" A red-tailed hawk soared overhead, being harassed by an American crow. Other crows were on the ground in front of us walking near two cottontails that were busily feeding on vegetation. A male American kestrel, the smallest falcon in the U.S., flew from an overhead branch to a taller tree nearby. We watched as the kestrel searched the grass below, flew down to the ground, grabbed a sandwich for lunch, returned to his perch and used his hooked beak to tear apart lunch (looked like a grasshopper) held in his talons.

Birding isn't always about seeing the most birds. Much bird behavior can't be learned from a bird guide. When I gave up competitive birding, I found joy in patiently sitting on a log or in my car (used as a blind). My next scheduled bird walk will probably be in April, 2018. I hope you can join me
